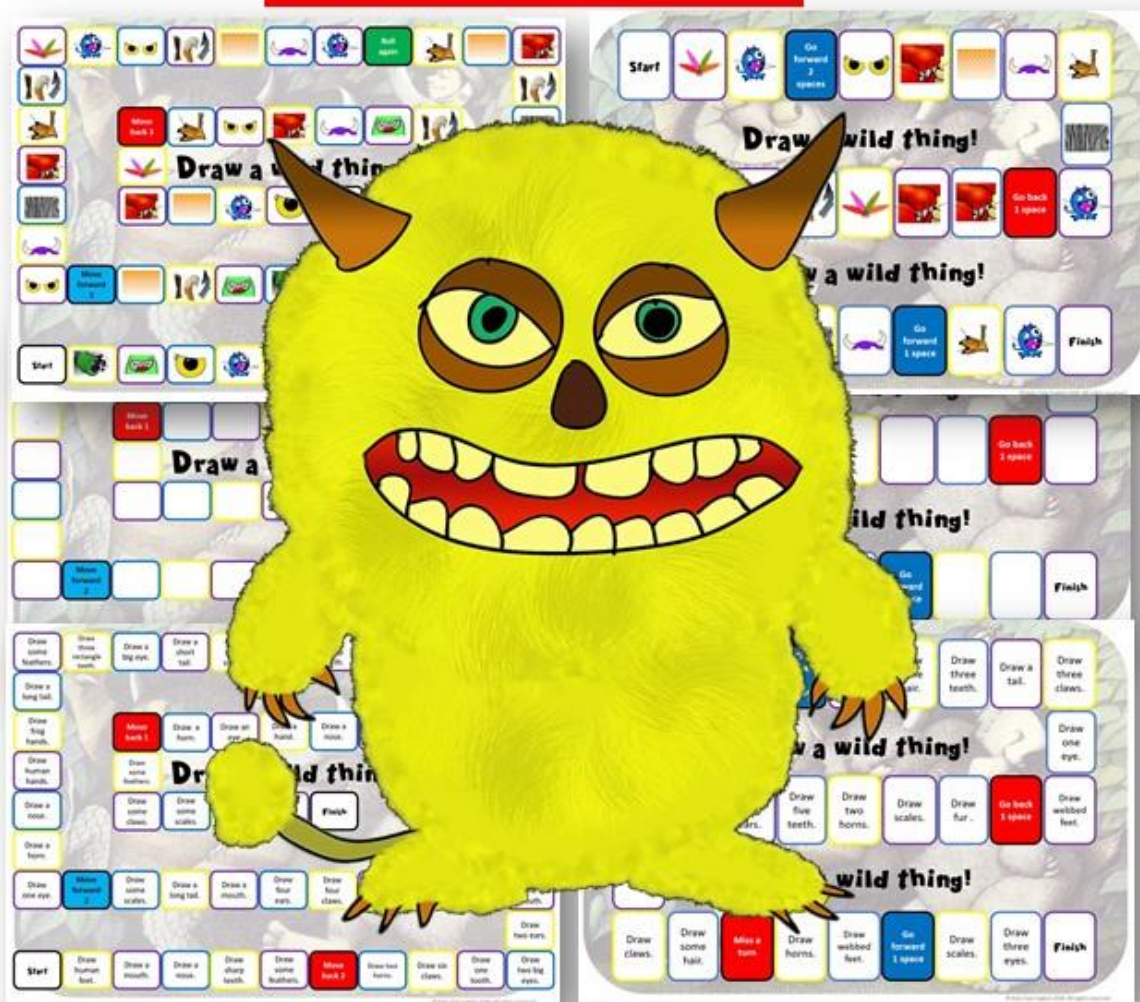

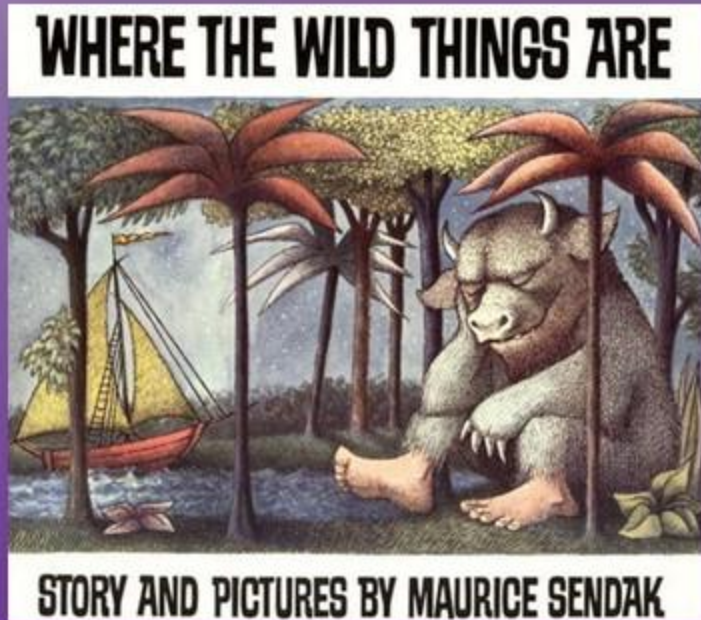

Play a game, practise body parts and create your own WILD THING!



Where the Wild Things Are board games

There are six different board games to choose from, all available in either colour or black and white. Three are longer games and three are shorter. While playing each game, the children draw their very own Wild Thing, depending on the squares they land on, each game focuses on **animal body parts**.

Longer game boards

- Read and draw
- Look and draw
- Create your own board game

Shorter game boards

- Read and draw
- Look and draw
- Create your own board game

There is also a 'My Wild Thing' template. Print a copy for each child to decorate as they play the game. Alternatively, give the children blank paper to create their own body shape.

Find and stick body part images are included to use with the create your own board game versions.

The body parts included are:

feathers, teeth, eyes, tail, scales, horns, webbed feet, claws, fur, nails, ears, mouth

Activity suggestions:

Basic game play directions

1. Organize the children into teams, give each child the 'My Wild Thing' template or blank paper and a pencil, if you prefer to use blank paper, give each child time to draw a body outline.
 2. Give each group of children a board game, dice and counters.
 3. The children take turns rolling the dice and moving round the board. When they land on a square, they should say the name of the body part and draw this item on their template.
 4. When the children have finished playing, ask them to show and describe their monsters, e.g. My wild thing has got five eyes, one horn, eight sharp teeth and feathers.
- Other follow-up could include **class surveys** - how many wild things have got three eyes? Character **builds** - what's your wild thing's name? How old is it? Where does it live? Can it fly? Can it swim? Does it like chocolate? What's its favourite colour?

Create your own board game suggestions

- Incorporate more language practice by having the children make the board game before they play it. Use the blank board game templates and the find and stick pictures.
- Scatter the pictures in an area/area of the room. Encourage the children to chant 'What has it got?' then tell them the name of the item to find and stick on their board.
 - Cut the body pictures into same part sets. The children come and ask you for the items they want, e.g. 'Can I have two eyes, please?'
 - Give the children a set of pictures to cut up themselves. Monitor, prompting individuals to tell you what body parts they have chosen.

Black and white version suggestions

Use the black and white versions to conduct a colour dictation. Use complete phrases, e.g., 'My wild thing has got horns', 'They are eyes', 'They are scales'. Make it competitive if you wish - first group to finish colouring the item wins.


