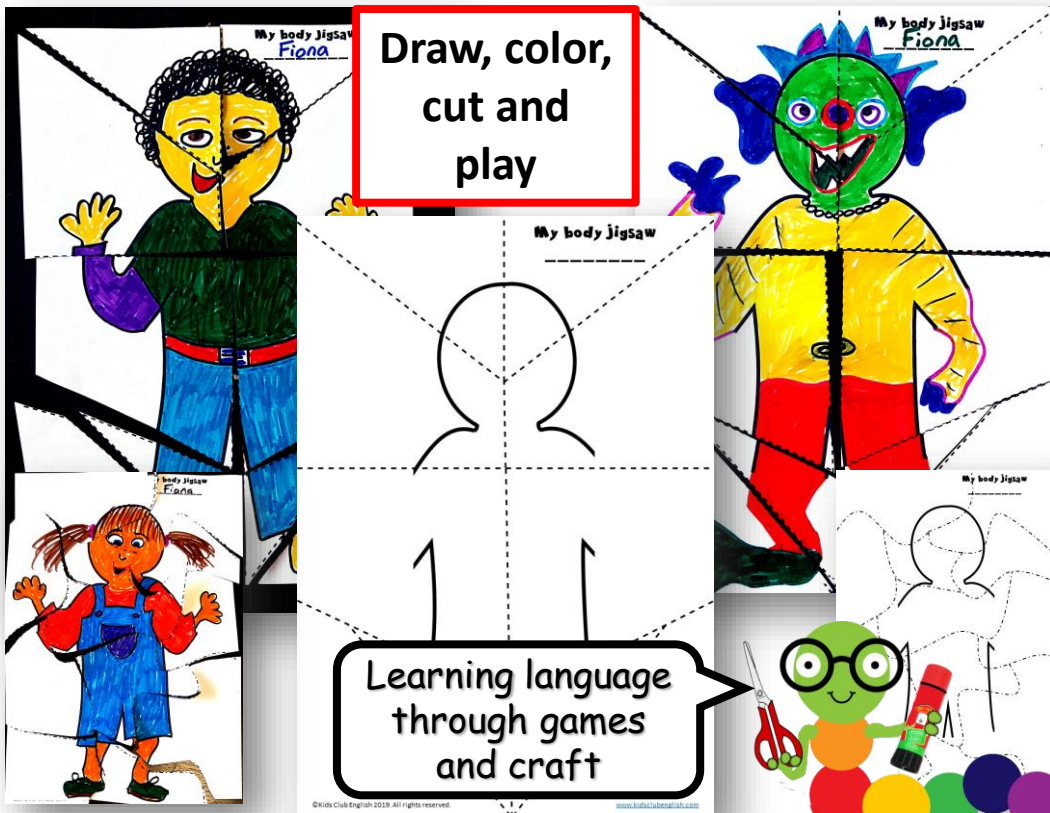

Body parts

Create and cut jigsaw

There are two versions of this jigsaw: easier straight line cuts and more difficult curved line cuts.

In both versions, the children have to first draw their picture. They could create a monster or a person. After completing their picture, they should cut along the lines to create their jigsaw.

There are sheets provided for reverse-side printing with space for the children to write their names. This will hopefully prevent pieces getting mixed up or going missing during play.

There are also three envelope templates for storing the pieces. They include possible fast finisher tasks, such as matching image and text or drawing the body parts in boxes.

Activity suggestions:

1.

Draw and
colour
dictation

1. Print copies of the jigsaw picture. If you can print on card, it will be easier to play with later.
2. Give a copy to each child. Play 'listen and point'. For example, 'Point to the shoulders'; 'Point to the hips'.
3. Conduct a drawing dictation, e.g., 'Draw the eyes'; 'Draw the eyebrows', etc.
4. Conduct a colour dictation.
(You can control the dictations, or you could let the children work in pairs and take turns dictating different instructions to each other. You may also prefer to let them draw and colour freely while you monitor, asking questions and making comments.)
4. The children can then cut their jigsaws and put their pieces in their envelopes. Fast finishers can complete one of the activities: matching words to pictures or drawing the body parts in the boxes.

There are a variety of ways you could play with the jigsaws after making it.

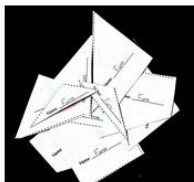
- Have a jigsaw race. The child swaps their jigsaw with you or another child and you race to complete them.
- Practise vocabulary by asking the children to hold up jigsaw pieces, containing a specific item, e.g., 'Can you find the mouth?'
- Play a game of 'What's missing?'. Each child hides a piece of their jigsaw and their partner has to say what piece is missing, using the vocabulary, e.g., 'It's a foot'.
- Jumble up a group of jigsaws. Can they still complete the originals from the mix?

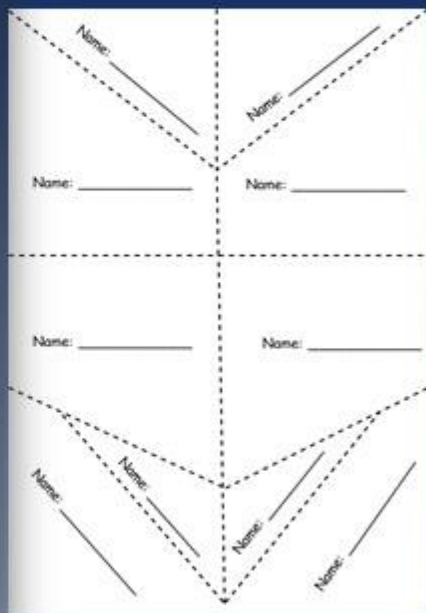
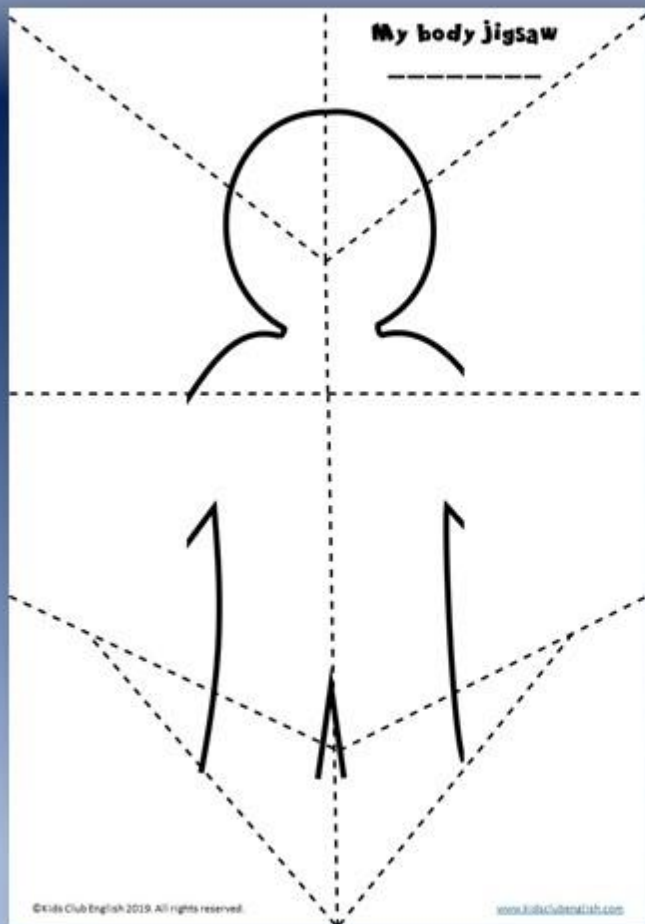
Curved line pieces

storing pieces

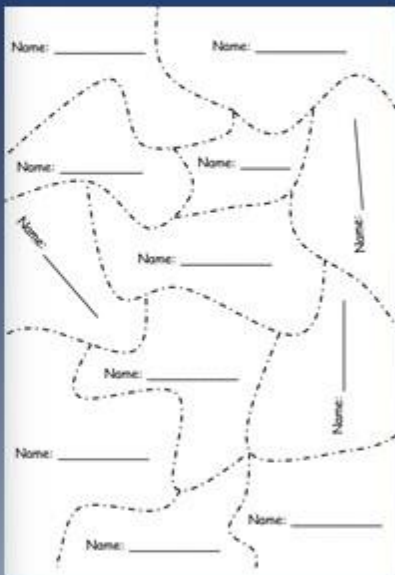


Straight line template
